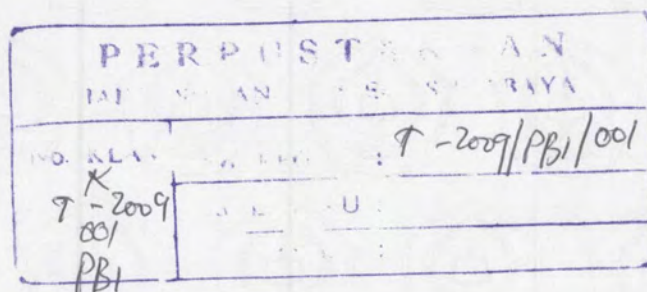

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ABSTRACT

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Keywords: Pragmatic, Utterance, Speech Act, Illocutionary and Perlocutionary act.

By analyzing the language of literary work, especially short story, we may inquire knowledge about the types of illocutionary and perlocutionary acts in the short story that may happen in the real life like the acts of suggesting, asking, asserting, agreement or disagreement, concluding, warning, and praising. Most of them usually happen in human real life, especially in spoken language. The problems of the study are what the types of illocutionary act and what is the perlocutionary act in the dialogues of Hello Magazine's short stories.

This study applied a descriptive qualitative research. The purpose of this study is to describe the practical application of language, which is pragmatics, in a short story by analyzing and classifying the types of illocutionary and perlocutionary acts in the dialogues of short story through speech acts theory. The step used to obtain and collect the data is identifying and classifying the types of illocutionary and after that the perlocutionary act. The data is limited only five editions.

Dealing with finding and discussion, the illocutionary acts consist of representative, expressive, directive, and commissive. While the perlocutionary act is the effect of the hearer.

The last, hopefully the next researcher conduct an analysis of the types and the classification acts more deeply. Beside that the next researcher can analyze why the hearer's response sometimes is not the same with the expected response of the speaker or the relationship between the expected response and implicit meaning in the dialogue. This kind of analysis can also be applied in any other literary work, especially drama or novel.

CHAPTER I

INTRODUCTION

A. Background of the Study

English as international language becomes more important. It is used by a lot of people in the world. English has an important function as a means of communication among people in different part of the world. No one can live without communicating with others, when people have something in their minds, they will convey their thought, their feeling. Therefore, before they show something in their minds, they arrange the meaningful statement; they really understand the statement to make the receiver to reveal their aims with ease.

According to Yuliana¹ there are two kinds of communication; verbal and non-verbal communication. We can use words to express what we want to say. In verbal communication words are arranged in meaningful pattern and used to communicate. It is different from non-verbal communication, we do not use words to express what we have in mind. Instead, we use cues, gestures and facial expressions in order to communicate.

In Ima Chusnul Chotimah's research² human being uses language to perform their feelings, ideas, and thoughts and purposes to communicate with others that involve the message inside. They have to follow the culture in which and on which language is used. It is needed to make understand and avoid misunderstanding between the speaker and the listener. The most important thing should be known, that the key of language is able to be seen as a form of action that spoken or written utterances constitute the performances of speech acts such as promising or asking or asserting or warning, a different plan, referring to people or things and implicating meanings which are not just a matter of overtly expressed.

In line with this term, Soekemi³ inspires that an utterance is any stretch of talk, by one person, before and after which there is a silence on the part of that person. On the other hand she states that an utterance is the use by a particular speaker, on a particular occasion, of a piece of language, such as a sequence of sentences, a single sentence, a single clause, a single phrase, or just a single word. Utterances are physical events. Events are lasting for short times.

Another opinion says that an utterance is a complete unit at speech in spoken language. It is generally but not always bounded by silence. It can be

represented and delineated in written language in many ways. Note that utterance do not exist in written language, only their representations do⁴.

Considering that, in this study, the writer intends to investigate the language uttered by dialogues in Hello Magazine's short stories, especially from the point of view of speech act, because it has relation with pragmatic study, and pragmatics is appealing because it is about how people make sense of each other linguistically, but it can be a frustrating area of study because it requires us to make sense of people and what they have in mind.

Based on that statement, the writer is interested in this study and tries to identify and classify the dialogues in Hello Magazine's short stories, because from the short story's dialogues the writer finds the utterance that appropriate with Searle's theory about speech act. An example of the dialogue that the writer finds is "*Thanks, Al. That's so nice of you*" the illocution used in this statement is expressive. It shows that the dialogues of Hello Magazine's short stories can be analyzed from the point of view of speech act.

Besides that, the writer chooses Hello Magazine because it is popular. It is read by students from Junior High School until University. We can see from the reader's forum, where the loyal readers read Hello Magazine since they were in Junior High School until University, even a housewife and a teacher. Most of

them say that Hello Magazine is easy to read and to understand, because it is printed for all generation and make us easy to learn English, especially on short story.

There are many theses written about speech act theory. These are about what speech act is, kind of speech act, how it's used, what requesting act, thanking, apologizing, and forbidding are. Then, the difference with this thesis is the problem that would be analyzed. The writer chooses illocutionary act and perlocutionary act as the object of the study. Because, the writer wants to analyze the illocutionary act.

B. Problems of the Study

Based on the background above, in this study the writer states the main problem as follow:

6. What is the Illocutionary act of the utterances, which occur in the Hello Magazine's short stories?

C. Purpose of the study

The purposes of the study are:

“ To identify and classify the types of Illocutionary act of the utterances which occur in the dialogues of Hello Magazine’s short story.”

D. Significance of the Study

The significance of the study is to analyze the dialogues which occur in Hello Magazine's short stories. The result of this study is expected to be useful reference for pragmatic study, especially on Illocutionary act and to inform English Departments' students. It also hopefully helps the reader to enhance the understanding and interpretation of the dialogues in Hello Magazine's short stories. The result of this study may be useful for the future in the same field.

E. Scope and Limitation

Because of the limited time and knowledge that the writer has, the writer would like to limit this study. This study only focuses on analyzing the dialogues in the point of view of speech acts, especially in types of Illocutionary act. The writer will analyze each dialogue of the short stories in Hello Magazine published in November 2008-March 2009.

F. Definition of Key Terms

a. Utterances

Something people say, or the action of saying something⁵.

In this study the utterances means all dialogue that uttered by the characters in the Hello Magazine's short stories.

b. Speech Act Analysis

An approach that analyses the language by linguistics description focused on how the language works. Based on Austin 1962, speech act as action performed in saying something.

a) Illocutionary Act

The function of words, the specific purpose that the speaker has in mind

a) Analysis

Analysis is ubiquitous, it is impossible to write, speak, describe or think without doing it. Analysis is the process of describing what a particular solution is. Analysis begun when the data is first collected and is used to guide decisions related to further data collection

The analysis in this study is descriptive qualitative, to describe the dialogues uttered by the characters in the Hello Magazine's short stories.

G. THESIS ORGANIZATION

This thesis is organized into five chapters. It is begun with chapter I, Introduction, which covered the background of the study, problem of the study, purpose of the study, significance of the study, scope and limitation, definition of key terms, and thesis organization.

Following the Introduction was Chapter II, which is review of related literature. This chapter was divided in discussion of pragmatics, dialogues, utterances, speech acts, locutionary acts, illocutionary acts, perlocutionary acts, speech acts classification, short story and previous study.

Next, in chapter III, research methodology, the researcher states the method used to conduct the research. This chapter covered of design of research, source of data, instrumentation, data collection technique, and data analysis.

The analysis of the collected would be done thoroughly in chapter IV, which is analysis of the study, which provides the findings and discussion. Finally, the researcher concludes all the result of the analysis and provided it in chapter V that consists of Conclusion and suggestion.

A. Pragmatics

Brown and Yule⁸ say that both focus on the meaning of words in interaction and how interactions communicate more information than the words they use. The speaker's meaning depends on assumption of knowledge that is

they use. The speaker's meaning depends on assumption of knowledge that is shared by both the speaker and hearer: the speaker constructs the linguistic message and intends or implies a meaning, and the hearer interprets the message and infers the meaning.

Cook states the second feature that pragmatics and discourse analysis have is that they both look at discourse, of the use of language, and text or pieces of spoken or written discourse, concentrating on how stretches of language become meaningful and unified for their users⁹.

Finally, Coulthard inspires that pragmatic and discourse analysis has in common the fact that they are both concerned with function: the speakers' short-term purposes in speaking, and long-term goals in interacting verbally. Discourse analysis studies how large chunks of language beyond the sentence level are organized, how the social transaction imposes a framework on discourse¹⁰.

In line with this term, Cutting states that discourse analysis has traditionally covered the topic of exchange structure, or how certain situations have fixed sequences in the overall framework of the exchange, and conversation structure or how what one speaker says can influence the next speaker's response. Pragmatics takes a socio-cultural perspective on language usage, examining the

philosophy of language. Precise conceptions are varying, but very roughly any meaningful utterance counts as a speech act¹⁶.

According to Austin¹⁷ says that some sentences are not used just to give information or ask questions about some piece of information, but to perform actions actively. In other words, sentences are not only questions or statements but also actions. That is why, he groups utterances into two: constantives and performatives. Constantives are utterances that give information or description, so constantives can be true or false depending on the information or description given.

On the other hand, performatives are utterances that perform social actions or do things¹⁸. Those utterances cannot be true or false because they do not contain information or description. In other words, the distinction between constative and performative utterances lies on the difference between saying something, which is, asserting that something is or is not the case, and doing something by means of language.

Later, Austin formulates more general theory of speech acts. He mentions that utterances can be analyzed on three different levels of act: locutionary act, illocutionary act, and perlocutionary act.

D.2. Searle's Speech Act classification

Searle's solution to classify speech acts was to group them in the following macro-classes. One general classification system lists five types of general functions performed by speech acts: declarations, representatives, expressives, directives, and commissives²¹.

D.2.1. Declaratives

Declaratives are those kinds of speech acts that change the world via the utterances. These are, words and expressions that change the world by their very utterance, such as 'I bet', 'I declare', 'I resign'. Others can be seen in: 'I baptize this girl Britney Spears', which change nameless baby into one with a name. 'I hereby pronounce you man and wife', which turns two singles into a married couple, and 'this court sentence you to ten years imprisonment', which puts the person into prison.

In using a declaration, the speaker changes the world via words.

The illocutionary acts that bring about the state of affairs they refer to, e.g. 'blessing', 'firing', 'baptizing', 'bidding', and 'passing sentence'.

F. Previous Study

As guidance the writer would like to present three studies that were closely related to study she is conducting. First, a research of pragmatic study of speech acts used by Ma'ruf Islamudin in speech (preach) that was written by I'ma Chusnul Chotimah. She conducted research about speech act used in Ma'ruf Islamudin's preach.

In collecting data, she used a qualitative approach. She got the data by listening the utterances spoken by Ma'ruf on VCD cassettes under the title Mengatasi Persoalan Hidup. After that she made transcription of the words or the utterances used by Ma'ruf in his preach. And then she observed the utterances spoken by Ma'ruf in preach related to the kinds of speech acts.

The second is a study of speech act of president and vice president candidates in the general election 2004 that was written by Luluk Humaidah. She conducted a research about speech act used by president and vice president especially on promising act.

The third study that was closely related to this study is a study of illocutionary and perlocutionary acts in Hello Magazine's short stories 2007 that was written by Retno Mareta Hartari.

Similar with the first, in collecting data, all those studies applied a qualitative approach; they read several editions of newspaper and magazine as their source of data. For the second study, she read newspaper started from 1 Juny 2004 - 5 July 2004 to look for promising act in the SBY-Kalla statement in the general election 2004.

For the third, she read Hello Magazine for seven months started from January until July. She read carefully to found the illocutionary and perlocutionary acts and also she identified the intended meaning.

Thus, the writer also conducted the similar study on the illocutionary and perlocutionary acts. The difference was that she identified and classified the illocutionary act in Hello Magazine's short stories published in November 2008-March 2009.

A. Research Design

Creswell states that in a qualitative research, the author will describe a research problem that can best be understood by exploring a concept or phenomenon²⁴. He suggested that qualitative research is explanatory and researchers use it to explore a topic when the variables and theory base are unknown. Morse states that there are several characteristic of a qualitative research, they are²⁵:

Ary states that qualitative researches seek to understand a phenomena by focusing on the total picture rather than breaking it down into variables. The goal is a holistic picture and depth of understanding, rather than a numeric analysis of data. There are many different types of qualitative research: ethnography, case studies, document analysis, naturalistic observation, focused interviews, phenomenology studies, grounded theory, and historical studies²⁶.

The writer will employ a qualitative research and the technique of analysis is descriptive research design. The writer will choose descriptive qualitative method because the data are in the form of words or utterances of the dialogues and she attempts to describe the natural phenomena of speech acts used on the dialogues of Hello Magazine's short stories.

B. Source of Data

In this research the writer uses the short stories in Hello Magazine as the source of the data. The writer uses them by reading and analyzing several editions.

Ary states that content analysis focuses on analyzing or interpreting recorded material within its own context. The material may be public records, textbooks, letters, films, tapes, diaries, themes, reports, and so on. When using

such a documentary source, the writer must establish the authenticity of the document itself, as well as the validity of its content²⁷.

C. Research Instrument

The instrument used by the writer in this study is content analysis. The writer uses those kinds of instrument or technique of collecting data because, this study is concerned with the text analysis, for which the elements of text such as: words, utterances, or dialogues are to be analyzed.

D. Data collection technique

The writer reads carefully each of the utterances on the dialogues of Hello Magazine's short stories and analyzes the type of speech acts used. In order to find the types of speech acts on the dialogues of Hello magazine's short stories, then the writer identifies the types of speech act by looking at the deep structure of these sentences and analyzes them, then classifies them based on the types of speech act.

E. Data Analysis

To analyze the data the researcher uses a descriptive qualitative interpretative analysis. First step, the researcher read the data, then the writer classifies the data based on the kinds of illocutionary acts.

CHAPTER IV

FINDINGS AND DISCUSSION

In this chapter, the writer presented the findings of the data and discussion of the results. The findings and the discussions are based on the statements of the problems. It presented the writer's interpretation, which is derived from analyses of the data that relates with the theory mentioned in the previous chapter.

In presenting the findings and the discussions of the data, the writer classified and discussed based on the statement of the problems. It is about the kinds of illocutionary acts, and perlocutionary acts on the dialogues of Hello Magazine's short stories. This discussion is based on the dialogues of Hello Magazine's short stories published in November 2008 – March 2009.

The first story is entitled *Capsized* edition 275, November 2008, told about a guy who could not forget his first love. Until he decided to go to Jogja to look for his first love before he got married with a girl that he never loves. And his decision supported by his friends. Then, he went to Jogja with Edgar beside him. But, their search was failed; they could not find that girl. They only met her sister and she told that Liliana lives in Singapore now. After that they came back to Jakarta and Sebastian tried to face the reality and tried to love Prita, a girl who will be his wife. And when the wedding almost closer, he met Liliana, his first love as Prita's best friend.

The second is *Between Love Songs, Romantic and Betrayal* edition 276, December 2008, told about a girl who has betrayed by her darling. He has a big mistake that she never could to forgive. Even though she has too much memories of sweet moment with him and romantic songs about them, but she must to be a strong girl who could survive. Even though she could forgive his mistake but she could not accept him back, because she did not want to live with a liar like him.

The third is *Life's Intersection* edition 277, January 2009; told about a doctor who has to choose two too difficult options. She tended to save the rape victim over the rapist, beside that she has to be a professional doctor who helped all patients regardless of the social status. She was confused of that situation. Finally, she helped the patient who came first, he is the rapist. After that she helped the rape victim. Unfortunately, she could not save her life; she was died when Celia came to the Room. She could not accept it. She thought that all are her fault; she was causing the rape victim died.

The fourth is *The Worst Kind of Deception* edition 278, February 2009; told about the couple of husband and wife who did not get a baby yet after a few years they are together. They have visited some doctors but they said that there was a scar in his wife's womb. That was why she could not deliver a baby. In fact, the scar was related to his wife's past. She never told to her husband because she was afraid of him. And when she told how the scars are in her womb, the husband could not

A.1. Representatives

Started from the first short story entitled *Capsized* which told about Sebastian who could not forget his first love, until he would get married in less a week he decided to seek his lost love. But he was not succeeding to find the girl.

When he realized that his true love is Prita and ready to live with her, he met his first love Liliana. From this short story the writer found the dialogues that include of representatives.

*'I just..., ' Sebastian paused to down his drink, and Edgar could see that it was certainly not soda. 'I just couldn't stop thinking of Liliana.' 'Prita Tian. You're marrying Prita, not Liliana' Edgar said. (C. 2008: 24), the dialogues have illocutionary acts as **informing** and **insisting**. The first speaker stated firmly that he could not forget the girl whose name is Liliana, she was his first love. The speaker informed the hearer that he always remember of Liliana, that was why he could not feel happy in his party. While, the second speaker stated that Liliana was his past. The speaker looked like try to remain the hearer that he would marry Prita not Liliana. Those two illocutions are relating to representatives illocutionary.*

From the first utterance, *'I just...I just couldn't stop thinking of Liliana'* which have representative illocutionary act as **informing** caused the hearer

knows the fact. Sebastian as a speaker intended to inform the hearer that he could not forget Liliana. So, Edgar as the hearer knew the fact that his best friend never could forget the girl, even though he would marry Prita.

Next utterance have representative illocutionary act of **insisting** '*Prita Tian. You're marrying Prita, not Liliana*'. Here, Edgar as a speaker stated firmly tried to remain the hearer that the girl was his past, and now he would marry Prita, his future. It made the hearer realized that he must forget Liliana.

In the second short story, by the titled *Between Love Songs, Romantic, and Betrayal* which told about a woman who had betrayed by her darling then she could not accept him back, because she never could live with someone who could not keep a relationship, there also dialogue that has representative illocutionary.

'I ended a week ago because I realized that our wedding is looming and I want to concentrate on you, on the great life that we will share together. She's nothing compared to you, but at that time you were busy with your works and the wedding preparation, and I was...well...I was lonely, I was weak.' (BLSRB 2008: 31) The utterance has illocutionary act as **stating**. The speaker intended to inform the hearer what he felt. As an act of affirming, it could be said that a speaker might bring an act of **stating** in uttering the utterances. Particularly, this act meant to give new information to hearer which might be a firm perception or

stupid, and I made the worst decision I could have ever made. By the time I realized I was pregnant, I was too far gone that no doctors would take the risk to abort it. So, I went to this guy – people said he was some kind of a witch doctor who could perform miracles and he agreed to help me getting rid of the baby.' (WKD 2009: 24), and also in the fifth short story: *He laughed, running his fingers through what was left of his previously lush hair. 'Well, when you live in the jungle, there's not much choice in hair styles', he shrugged.* (RU 2009: 30).

The perlocutionary effect of that utterance is make the hearer understands more. Rasti explained to her husband about her past. From Rasti's explanation Ari knew the cause of his wife's scars and how it could be happen to her.

The other kind of representative illocutionary found on the dialogue in the third short story; *'I thought you're carrying a 15-year old rape victim?'* The paramedic shook his head. *'No, doc, she is in the other ambulance. They got held in traffic. Should be here any minute, though.'* (LI 2009: 25) the dialogue has representative illocutionary act of **answering**. A speaker intended to replay what the other speaker asked. According to Searle, an illocutionary act of answering include in representatives.

The perlocutionary act of the utterance is causing the hearer gets what she looked for. By this utterance, Celia got the answer why the ambulance brought the rapist.

or some utterances above. And however, an illocution act of thanking is categorized by Searle as expressive.

The other kind of expressive illocution is praising shown in utterances 'Well, You do have a very nice voice' (C 2008: 24) and 'You look beautiful' (RU 2009: 30). However, an illocution act of praising is categorized by Searle as expressive.

One of kinds of expressive illocution that writer found is **regretting**, as shown in this utterances '*I should have tended to her as soon as she was brought in,*' *she blubbered, gripping Alan's arms for strength. 'It's my fault she died. It's all my faults!* (LI 2009: 26); '*You know, what I regret the most is that had you told me this all those years ago before he we got married, I'm sure I'd be able to deal with it and accept you just the way you are. That's how much I love you. I'd be happy considering options like adoption or simply living without any children.*' (WKD 2009: 24). The writer was easily considering those utterances as expressive illocution of regretting because those utterances have mean regret. And an illocution of regretting belongs to expressive illocutionary act.

Then, the other kind of expressive illocution is **apologizing**, as shown in this utterances 'Sorry, dude. But at least now you chalk it up to fate and wouldn't took back and regret that you didn't give it a try' (C 2008: 27); 'I'm sorry; I'd really like to help such a young couple like you both, but based on the clinical

In *Capsized* (2008: 25) above, the perlocutionary act is keep Sebastian's secret. It means that Sebastian did not want if everybody knows his past. And as best friends, they did what Sebastian asked.

For the *Life's Intersection* (2009: 25, 26, 27) here, the perlocutionary acts of the utterances above are the nurses did all what Celia commanded to them. They moved quickly as Celia asked them to help her in operating the patient.

Those are kinds of directives illocutionary act of **commanding**. When the speaker uttered all those utterances as above, the responds of the hearers would do an act as when the speaker commanded to them.

Requesting is also one kind of illocutionary act. And it was found in some utterances in the dialogues of Hello Magazine's short stories; they are: *'May we have her phone number?'* (C 2008: 26); this utterance has directives illocutionary act of **requesting**. It is occurred when Sebastian and Edgar looked for Lilian to Jogja, a town where she lives. But, they did not meet her. They only met her sister. Then, Edgar tried to get her cell phone number by asking to her sister. But her sister replied that she still uses her old number. The answer from her sister is the perlocutinary act from that utterance.

'*Will you marry me?*' (BLSRB 2008: 30) this utterance has directives illocutionary act of **requesting**. The perlocutionary act of this utterance shown in a positive respond from the girl by answering '*Yes, yes, oh yes, I'll marry you*'. It shows that Mia as the hearer accept Niko's request to marry him.

31) this utterance has directives illocutionary act of **requesting**; from this utterance we knew that Niko asked Mia to give him a second chance. By this utterance the hearer wanted to give him a chance as the perlocutionary act from the utterance.

'People we're getting two critical patients. Please make sure everything is ready. And call doctor Alan, please, tell him to be ready to help out. I might need his help later.' *'Okay, first we need to stop the bleeding. Tell me his vital signs.'* *'It's okay. We'll do it now. Prepare the needle and catgut, please.'* *'Can you take over?'*, *'I need the ambubag, please!!'*, *'Come on Lina. Don't give up on me, please!'* (LI 2009: 25); those utterances have directives illocutionary act of **requesting**; in those utterances Celia asked all the nurses to help her in saving someone's life, and for the perlocutionary act the nurses did all what Celia ask to them.

'Please, let me clean her up,' (C 2009: 26) this utterance has directives illocutionary act of **requesting**; Celia was regret because she could not

save the rape victim, for the last thing she could do she wanted to clean the rape victim from the blood, that was why she replaced two attendants were cleaning up the girl's body for the release process. And they allowed her to do it. It was the perlocutionary act of the utterance.

23) this utterance has directives illocutionary act of **requesting**. Here, Ari asked Rasti not to give up, he wanted she keeps struggle with him to heal the scars in order to they could get a baby as they want, and it is the speaker wants as the perlocutionary act.

'Don't leave me. Please don't leave.' (WKD 2009: 24) this utterance has directives illocutionary act of **requesting**. Here, Rasti asked to Ari not to leave her, and as the perlocutionary act from this utterance she wanted he keeps stay beside her.

All the utterances above have directive illocution as **requesting**, because they used requesting words.

Suggestion is one kind of directive illocution also found in some utterances, they are: *'But just in case, you have my cell number, right? Just give me a call if it's really an emergency.'* This is kind of utterance which have directive illocutionary act of **suggestion**. Alan suggested if Celia needs some

helps, she could call him. And the perlocutionary act of this utterance is performed when Celia needed his help. She asked her assistant to call him.

'You can call Bambang, he's in the first ambulance and he's got cell.' (LI 2009: 24) this utterance has directive illocution as **suggestion**. When Celia asked why the hospital sent two ambulances to one place, the other nurse suggested her to call Bambang. After that she dialled Bambang's cell phone number to know what happened. It could be seen in this statement *'Celia checked the ER personnel's log for Bambang's cell number, and started dialing.'*

'Doc. The rape victim has arrived, and she's in a critical condition. I think you've got to take a look at her now.' (LI 2009: 25) this utterance has directive illocution as **suggestion**; in this situation, Celia confused what she has to do, the nurse suggested her to look at the rape victim, but she was operating the rapist who is a patient that come first. The nurse hopes she would help the rape victim as soon as possible as the perlocutionary act. Finally, she went to another Emergency Room to help the girl, but she was late.

'Look I will not force you to simply accept this as your fate. Instead, I advise you to get a second opinion', 'I urge you to go and see him to seek his advice.' (WKD 2009: 22) this utterance has directive illocutionary as **suggestion**. The doctor suggested to looking for another doctor's advice about Rasti's scars.

Then, they went to the doctor who recommended to them in the fifth day after they visit their doctor as the perlocutionary act.

'Ari, I think we need to start accepting the fact that perhaps we aren't meant to have children,' (WKD 2009: 23) this utterance has directive illocutionary as **suggestion**. Here, Rasti suggested to Ari to accept the fact that she could not deliver a baby and she could not have a baby. Rasti also suggested him to adopt a baby as an alternative for them, it shown in this utterance *'You still can,' she cried. 'We can adopt a lovely daughter or a handsome boy.'* (WKD 2009: 23, 24) Rasti hopes that her husband would accept her suggestion as the perlocutionary act from her utterances and he would do what she has suggested.

'Well, I think it's better that we explore this thing now, because back then it wouldn't have work out' (RU 2009: 31), those utterances bringing an act of **suggesting**, the writer considered that there is sense of advising from the speaker which suggested the hearer to do something as the speaker said.

In this point, the writer found only three kinds of directive illocution in the utterances which occurred on the dialogues of Hello Magazine's short stories, they are requesting, command and suggesting. And the perlocutionary act for the utterances which have directives illocutionary would cause the hearer would do something as the speaker said.

the rape victim alive even though she knew that she has died. It made the hearer deplores of those conditions, but they could do nothing to save her life.

'Ari, I'm tired of all those doctors and the painful tests and the needles...isn't this enough? And just think of how much it will cost us.' 'I can't deal with it now. I have to go and clear my head' (WKD 2009: 22) this utterance describes of Rasti's rejection to visit another doctor, she was sick of those situations. It made the hearer Ari tried to pursue his wife to visit the doctor.

'I can't deal with it now. I have to go and clear my head' (WKD 2009: 24), when Ari knew the truth, he could not accept his wife's explanation, even he could not forgive her. He decided to go and leave his wife. The perlocutionary act of this utterance is made the hearer deplores all that happened to her.

The writer considered that those utterances show a refusing statement because there are words 'No' in those utterances. Which is that word shows a negative statement or rejection.

The writer also found some utterances which have commissive illocutionary act of **offering**; they are: *'This doctor is the best in this field; he is an obstetrician who possesses an exceptional expertise in surgical treatments. I urge you to go and see him to seek his advice.'* *'Ari was still silent even after they arrived home and Rasti didn't even dare to break the ice. They ate their dinner in*

Based on the findings above, we could see that not all the utterances which occurred in the dialogues of Hello Magazine's short stories have five types of illocutionary acts which consist of representative, expressive, directives, commissive and declaratives. Some of them have three kinds of illocutionary acts, and some of them have four kinds of illocutionary acts.

The writer also has discussed the perlocutionary act of the utterances which have illocutionary acts that consist of kinds of illocutionary act, they are representatives, expressives, directives, commissives, above.

CHAPTER V

CONCLUSION AND SUGGESTION

This chapter presents the conclusion and suggestion of an analysis on dialogues in term of illocutionary and perlocutionary acts Hello Magazine's short stories published in November 2008-March 2009.

A. Conclusion

After describing and presenting the data analysis, and then understanding the result of the discussion above, the writer could conclude that speech act used in Hello Magazine's short stories published in November 2008-March 2009, are: representative, expressive, directive, and commissive.

Representative Illocutionary is concerning a locution bringing an act such as claiming, affirming, asserting, describing, predicting, and telling. Simply, all those action defined as representative illocutionary because they bring a perlocutionary effect to make the hearer gets more information and understanding about what the speaker uttered, or even the hearer gets new views about something from the speaker's utterance.

In the Hello Magazine's short stories that the writer analyzed, the writer found ten types of representative illocutionary, they are: informing, insisting, stating, describing, explaining, answering, affirming, reporting,

asserting, and predicting. Which is they are belongs to representative illocutionary.

Directive illocutionary is concerning a locution bringing perlocution effect to hearer would do what the speaker asks. The actions of the locution are such as command, requesting, inviting, and suggesting. In this kind of illocution, the writer found three types of directive illocution, they are: commanding, requesting, and suggesting.

Expressive illocutionary is concerning a locution which brings an act of expressing speaker's psychological state; it can be feeling of attitude about something. The action usually give effect to hearer feels regarded or glad. They are usually actions of thanking, praising, regretting, and deploring.

The types of expressive illocution that the writer found in the Hello Magazine's short stories are: thanking, praising, regretting, and apologizing.

Commissive illocutionary is concerning a locution which gives effect to the hearer to believe, sometimes it can be an effect that makes the hearer affected with what speaker utters. The actions brought by the utterance or locution such as swearing, vowing, promising, and offering.

The last types of illocution that the writer found in the Hello Magazine's short stories are: vowing, refusing, and offering. Those are belongs to commissive illocutionary according to Searle.

Those are the findings of this study of speech acts, a conclusion that writer can define from the result of analysis is that most utterances produced in the dialogues of Hello Magazine's short stories published in November 2008 – March 2009.

B. Suggestion

After drawing the conclusion of this study, the writer can give suggestions for future researchers. The first, the result of this study hopefully will help the reader to understand the types of speech act category that express in the dialogues of short stories, and analyze what the meaning of the words and the message of the author.

The second, the result of this study can be used as a reference for the students who want to study linguistics, which describes a pragmatic study, especially about speech acts. In this study, the writer limits the problems only five short stories from five editions of Hello Magazine, whereas there are other English magazines or novels that we can study. If further researcher would like to do that, it will enrich the linguistic study of English especially the speech acts.

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
